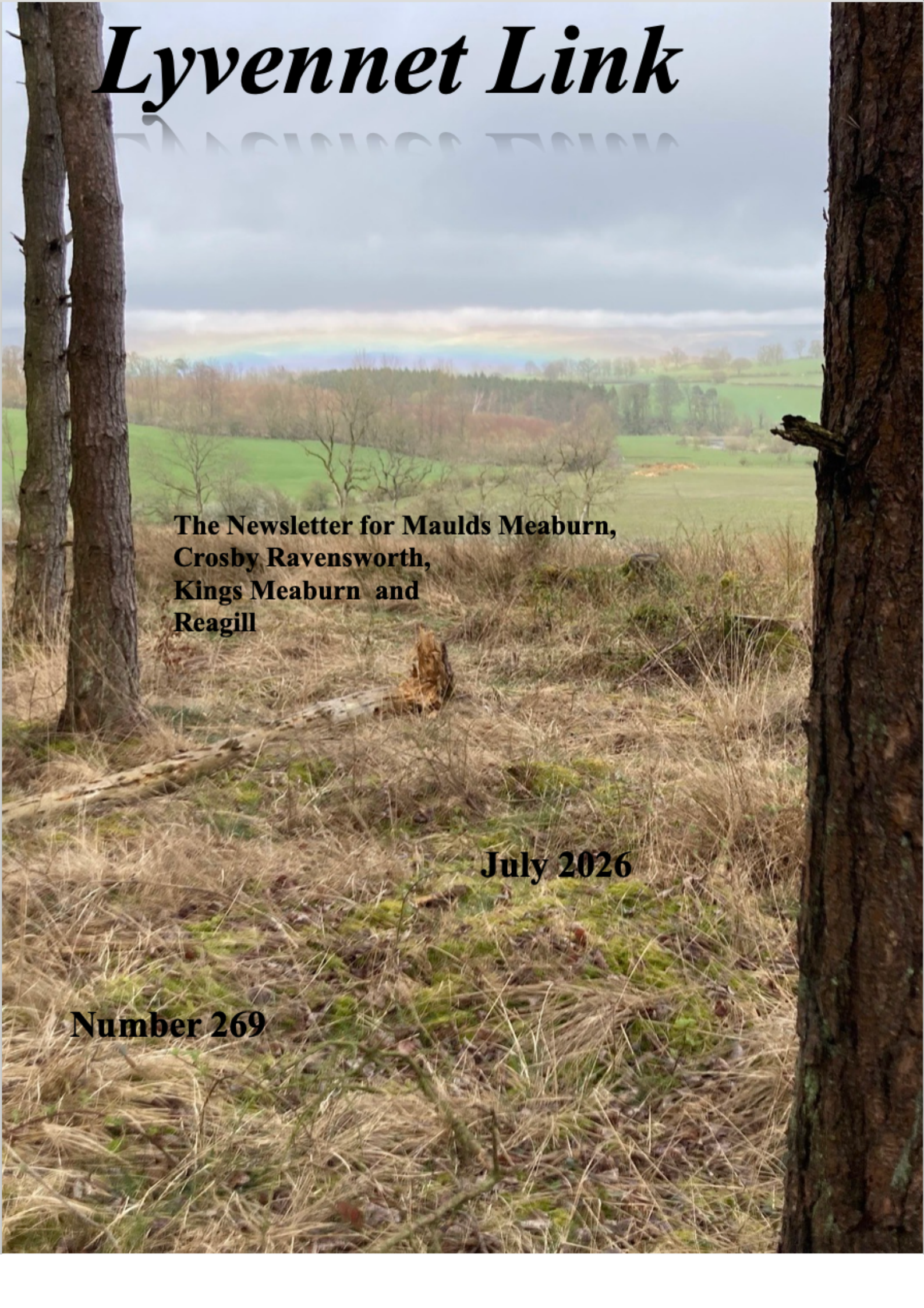

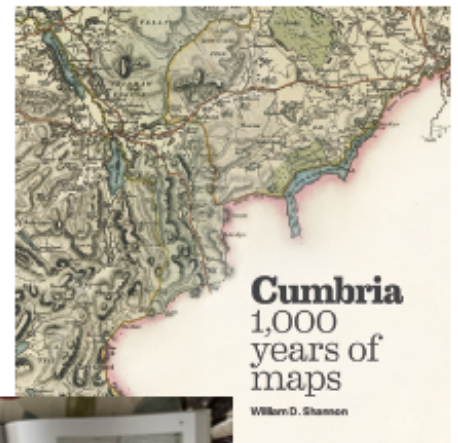

The Benches of the Parish

Following on from last month's first instalment in this new and exciting series of articles concerning the 'Benches of the Parish', this time our '**Bench of the Month**' is:

located just out of MM on the steep hill that goes up to Meaburn Edge and the road to Appleby – I think it really should be called the '**Forgotten Bench**'.

Below are the Google Maps view from September 2024



Oh dear, you would do well to even know that it is there!

However, on my visit at the end of May, things were a little better and you could even get to sit on it, although not too comfortably!

The grass still has all of the summer to grow and to totally hide the bench from view!

Even so, the chances are that you wouldn't use the bench now due to the amount of vegetation around it. Of interest is the fact that when you step off the road onto the bank to get to the bench, there is a shallow ditch. Because of the vegetation you could miss it, stumble and fall – but there is a concrete slab that acts as a little bridge to get you safely across, if you can find it!

Now, I guess that it is quite obvious as to why the bench is here – a place to rest after the steep struggle up the hill and the ‘S’ bends and for the view.

And whilst we may be slightly biased, that view is really rather splendid; although it is even better when you go over the road and look over the wall.

Yes the bench is next to the road, but that doesn't really matter in this case, it is all about that view; what a place to take a hard-earned rest and if you have walked/cycled up the hill then I'm sure that you deserve that rest.

And in spite of the ravages of time and a distinct lack of TLC, the bench whilst clearly quite old, is holding up quite well.

A hybrid of a metal frame and wooden slats, but it could possibly have done with one more slat on the back to increase the level of comfort. The seat is gently rounded so as to fit the contours of your body!

Note the curves and swirls in the metal work; whoever made this didn't just do a simple job, they put a little time and effort into it – and we have abandoned it!

As it is, it is semi-comfortable to sit on (if it wasn't for the vegetation).

So, if you ever do the walk (see map below) when you come down the track to the 'S' bends, instead of turning right to go straight back down to the village, turn left and go up to the bench and take in the view – hopefully you will be able to sit down on it when you do.

In conclusion: an old bench that requires a lot of TLC, not used very often, if at all, but a cracking view and most definitely a fine spot to '*Do a Davies*'.

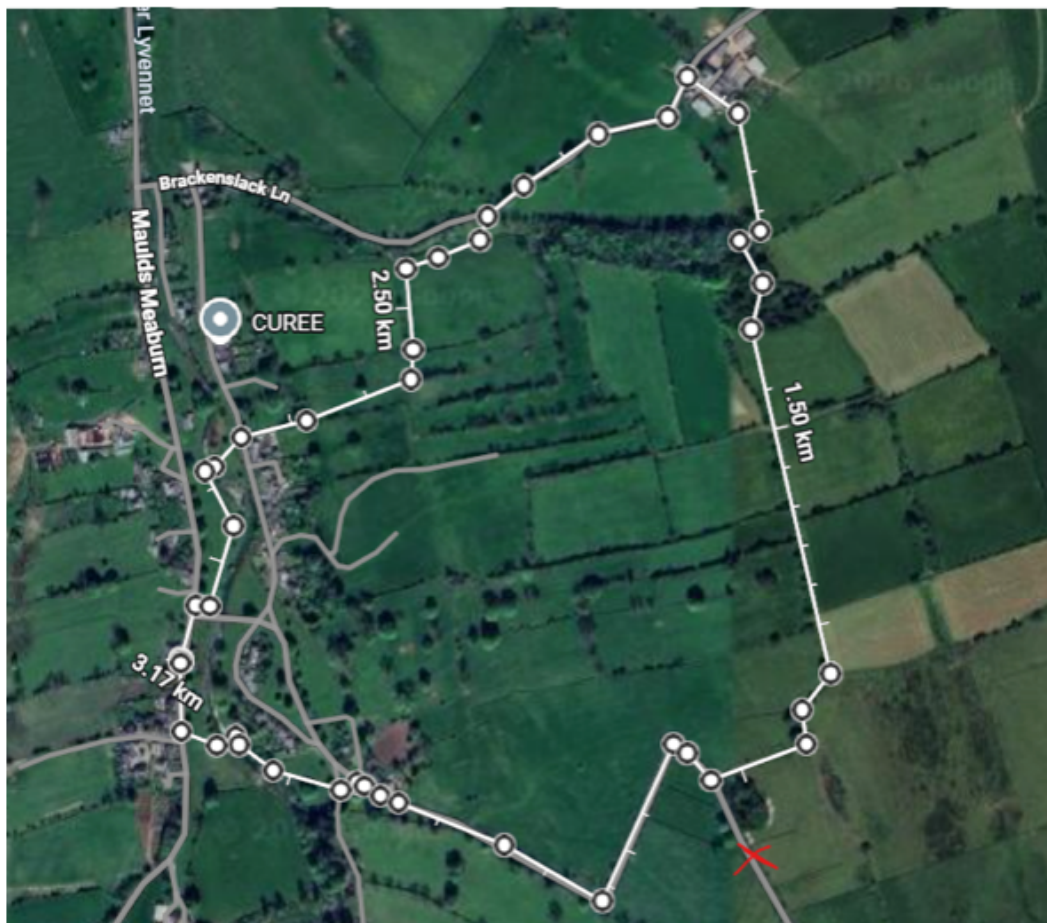
