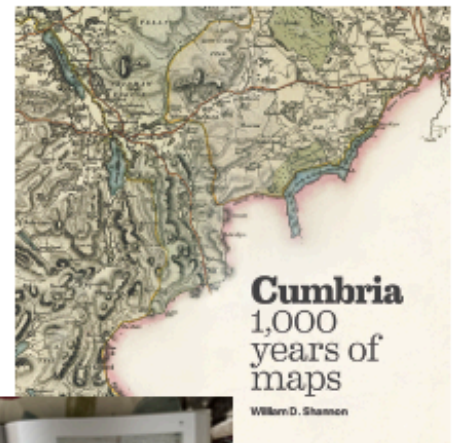

## PC Response to Benches of the Parish Link Article June 26.

Many thanks to the anonymous author of the *“New and Exciting Series”* of Benches of the Parish, the first instalment appeared in the June edition of the Link and indicated that a reply was expected from the PC. With the number of benches on the PC asset register, I’m looking forward to Bench of the Month for virtually the next two years. July’s bench of the month was described as **The Forgotten Bench**. The PC welcome’s scrutiny and thanks the author for their observations.

At the PC bi-monthly meeting on the 6<sup>th</sup> of July, It was agreed that I respond to the article. Someone once described local politics “like turning an oil tanker in the river Eden” *meaning nothing gets done quickly*.

For a number of months the PC have been carrying out parish duties with three members, although quorate, it is less than half of the seven members recommended.

The July meeting welcomed three newly co-opted members, however due to a resignation in May we are still short of the required number of councillors.

We do not have any councillors to represent either Maulds Meaburn or Reagill. .

Yes the PC are responsible for the upkeep and maintenance of the benches, they are also responsible for the maintenance of benches in memory of, and picnic tables, this is due to the fact they are on parish land and the PC would be held liable if there was an accident. The PC has a right to remove any benches in disrepair; in the case of a memorial bench families would be informed.

We would prefer the families to maintain the memorial benches and picnic tables (but it doesn’t always happen). Latterly a plaque in memory of, was placed on a historic bench in Maulds Meaburn, no permission was sought from the PC, the siting of the plaque caused quite an upset as that particular bench had been presented and paid for with the funds from a local organisation which was closing down. There was a claim that the memorial plaque had replaced the original plaque, however the PC could find no evidence of this.

Adding a memorial plaque to a historic bench really muddied the water, in future if that particular bench falls into disrepair do the PC members of the future approach the friends and family of the person named on the plaque to help with maintenance costs? It is only through local historic knowledge the background and age of this seat came to our attention.

For insurance purposes the PC need to update their asset register on a regular basis. The asset register can be found on the PC website.

The minutes of **July 2025** read *Cllrs discussed commissioning an external valuer to update the Asset register*. After many months of chasing up our chosen valuer we finally received the report on **JULY 6<sup>th</sup> 2026 the day of the PC meeting**, strangely enough it is **dated 13<sup>th</sup> January 2026** . The report cost the PC **£ 954-72**.

I need to carry out a site visit to Maulds Meaburn to cross check the original asset register against our valuation, the original asset register had ten benches, two picnic tables and a swing, the newly received valuation has eight benches two picnic tables and a swing. Has two benches been removed or has the valuer missed two? I suspect the latter as they were included in the Bench /Tables and Swings review of Maulds Meaburn, Crosby Ravensworth and Reagill, received by the PC in January 2026, kindly put together by a volunteer from MM..



The author of Benches of the Parish may be surprised to learn that neither of the missing benches is **“The Forgotten Bench” July’s bench of the month.**

June and July **LINK** editions of Benches in the Parish, feature benches of Maulds Meaburn, unfortunately we don’t have any volunteers to maintain the benches in MM since Mark Fallon left the area. However we did have a volunteer from MM who assessed and produced the written report mentioned above. I am more than happy to provide the written review to the author of the Benches in the Parish if they wish to take on the role of maintenance.

We have a couple of volunteers in Crosby Ravensworth who trim the grass and maintain the benches in CR, the written review was forwarded in March 2026 to the CR maintenance volunteers.

The volunteers provide their own equipment, but rightly claim expenses. The PC do own a trimmer.

It will be interesting to follow the series on the Benches in the Parish when the author ventures to Crosby Ravensworth.

The PC continuing seeking willing volunteers particularly in Maulds Meaburn and Reagill, both in the role of maintenance or to take on the role of a Parish Councillor.

## The Benches of the Parish

To continue this new and exciting series of articles in our parish magazine, this time for our ***'Bench of the Month'*** we are back in MM and will be looking at our first bench that is *'In Memory of'*.

This bench is located on the village green adjacent to the properties that make up *'Stepping Stones'* and is in memory of Maureen Newrick, who lived in one of those properties.

The plaque on the bench is both appropriate and touching, with a quote from Seamus Heaney. The bench itself is ideally placed on the green. It is near to the river and enjoys a fine aspect to the south, down the river back towards Bridge House and Cottage with the Stepping Stones cottages to the left. It is actually both a good place to sit in peace and quiet and to *'Do a Davies'*, but with the main road and village hall just across the river and then the road serving Stepping Stones, you also have a good spot to

keep an eye on what is going on, should you be that way inclined.

But will you actually see anyone using the stepping stones to cross the river?

Those stones are no longer the most welcoming that I have encountered, especially, but most importantly, once you get to the middle of the river.

However, back to the bench; made from wood, solid, fairly standard in design, but ideal for its purpose; that of serving in memory of, enhancing the enjoyment of the green and for its location.

It is firmly secured to the ground and big enough to sit three people, without too much of a squeeeeeeze. And it is certainly comfortable enough, catches the majority of any sunshine throughout the day; so just sit back and relax.

For completeness, I should mention that further along the green from here are two picnic benches. Both I believe were donated and certainly add a little something to the green.

### **Can you put a bench on MM green?**

Now, someone very kindly put some literature in MM bus shelter (but which quickly disappeared!) which is entitled: *'What can & can't you do on a village green'.*

Intrigued? So was I. Although it should be noted that it doesn't say:

*'What can & can't you do on Maulds Meaburn village green'.*

From dragon's teeth (!), putting up rugby posts, picking blackberries and even having a cock fight (but maybe best when it's warm and no fair maiden is anywhere near!), it's all there.

Curiously though you can't build a bus shelter, but with caveats you can!

More on this particular subject when we cover the benches at the shelter.

But curiously there is no mention of *'Can I put a bench on the green?'*

Therefore, if it isn't mentioned and if it enhances the enjoyment of the green, has a view and isn't for commercial gain, then ... crack on would be the inference to make. Can I reserve a plot for a bench?

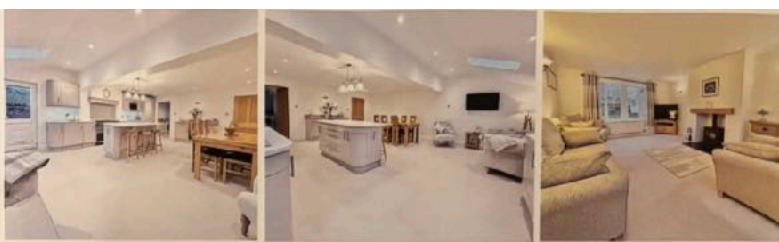
No doubt next month someone from the PC will have written to the editor to clarify these points.

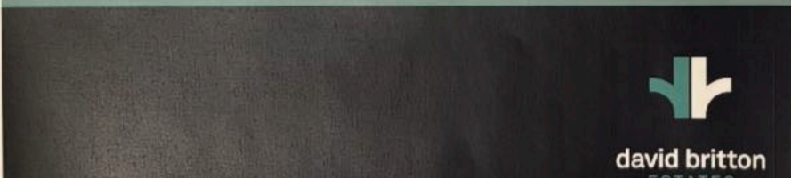
